# Land Acknowledgement

We acknowledge the painful history of genocide and forced removal from this territory, and we honor and respect the many diverse Indigenous peoples still connected to this land on which we gather. Without them, we would not have access to our education or the land we live, work, learn and commune on. We take this opportunity to thank the original caretakers of this land. Indigenous people of the past, present and future.

Interdisciplinary Arts and Sciences and the Barrett Honors College, where she plans to major in sociology and computer science. Violet would like to continue her education after ASU, attending the University of Copenhagen's Social Data Science Masters' program. Her goal: to work in societal research, studying countries' best practices and designing databases for improved research on a national and global scale.

—Violet Anderson Speech—

I am so proud of you. Before I even sat down to write this, I knew what my first sentence to you would be. Let me say it again, let it really sink in: I am so proud of you. Now, if you're anything like me, you might have some tears in your eyes already, we'll see how long it takes for me to join you, I think my family has bets at around 90 seconds.

I am so proud of you. And, I am so proud of myself. Before I started at PVCC, I never, in my wildest dreams, thought I could stand in front of you all today. Frankly, that has a lot to do with why I'm up here. I'd like to share a bit of my story, and in doing so want to acknowledge that while my story is unique, it is not uncommon. I enrolled at PVCC August of 2021; I was working from home 40 hours a week at a job I hated. I had recently moved back home to Arizona after living in Washington state for a few years, during which time I was in an abusive relationship. That relationship drained my passion and stripped me of all the confidence I had in myself. It suffocated me with self-doubt: I didn't take chances because I had already decided I would not succeed. Luckily for me, that didn't sit well with the extraordinary people I've met during my time here. PVCC and these incredible people have, in many ways, saved my life and altered what I

considered possible for my future. My journey here has been all about trying things, accomplishing things, thriving at things I never thought I could even start. It has been about being courageous in the face of self-doubt, being courageous despite the self-imposed threat of failure. My first small, courageous act was simply the desire for something better. It allowed me to take one step, one small shuffle towards an unknown future, and enroll in two classes at PVCC.

That small, courageous step in wanting something better for myself is why I am able to stand in front of you today. I was terrified, and in all honesty, at times-like right now- I still am, but I no longer let that fear dictate what I am capable of. I no longer allow fear, self-doubt, and other people's predictions of who I will be stand in my way of going after everything I know I am capable of. I'm sure there are a few of you here tonight who enjoy Disney movies; they're a staple in my family, particularly Cinderella. One lesson, given to Cinderella by her father just as my father has given to me, shapes my outlook and my actions: have courage, and be kind. Have the courage to stand up for yourself, advocate for yourself, show up for yourself and do the hard work. Maintain the kindness to uplift others, to add light to a too often dark world, to say "I am here for you, I believe in you, I will hold your hand". Have courage, even when your voice shakes, be kind, even when the world is not.

Courage is compounding. When you use a little bit, you gain more; when you get comfortable using it, it changes your outlook on life and what possibilities you consider for yourself. I gained more courage the first time I reached out to a teacher here at PVCC. One of my first two classes was Sociology 101 with Dr. Michele Marion. At the end of the class, I sent her a message, one I reread at least 12 times, asking her what other courses she taught. Now days, I send like 15 canvas messages in an afternoon and don't even blink. But man, that first one was absolutely terrifying. It was the one I needed the most courage for and was thus the most rewarding. Dr. Marion was the kindness from the world I needed. She said, in not so many words, I see your potential, I will remind you. What she actually said was you need to be in honors and I'm signing you up to be a peer mentor, simultaneously exciting and terrifying me. Thank you, Dr. Marion, for reminding me just how capable I am.

This small act of courage became a springboard for me to become the person I am today. Sending that canvas message gave me the courage to not only quit my job, but take on a 19-credit semester, formally declare sociology as my major and add computer science, serve as a peer mentor, become the President of our Phi Theta Kappa chapter, design award winning projects, earn the All-Arizona Academic team

scholarship, and dream of attending an international master's program.

You ever try to summarize your achievements and get a little impressed with yourself? That is what today is for. Today is about being kind to yourself, celebrating your accomplishments, and allowing others to be proud of you. I am so proud of us. I am so proud of what we are becoming. The courage of the people I see in front of me today is palpable. We've overcome setbacks, traumas, loss, and far too many 'unprecedented' events for the word unprecedented to still have meaning. But despite it all, we are here, we've done the hard work, we've shown up for ourselves and for others. We are courageous.

Today, as we celebrate our achievements and look back on our tribulations, do not forget to look forward. To what you can become: the leader you hope to be, the provider, the artist, the politician, the changemaker. Let us not forget how our time at PVCC has changed us, encouraged us to come into the best versions of ourselves, reminding us we are continuously growing and improving. Reminding us of our potential, so we may go forth and remind others. PVCC has taught us how to continue moving forward despite our setbacks, PVCC has taught us to have courage and be kind.

My hope for us is that we will maintain our kindness while we stand in our courage. As we go out into the world, do not forget that it takes courage to be kind. Please, stand in that courage, share that kindness; we need leaders who understand the importance of having both. Looking out at you now, I know we will be compassionate leaders who are courageous enough to speak up about injustice, unfairness, and unkindness. One of the most influential female anthropologists, Margaret Mead, believed that for the "future to remain open and free, we need people who can tolerate the unknown". PVCC has prepared us to not only tolerate the unknown, but to take confident steps into it, shedding our self-doubt and embracing our potential. As we step into the unknown of the future, I know we will be the leaders we would be proud to have, continuing to uplift those around us, just as Paradise Valley Community College has done for us.

But don't forget: unexpected opportunities lead to unexpected lessons.

Teaching was challenging because no matter how hard I worked, how much I invested in the kids - it sometimes felt like what I was doing was not valued by anyone. And I'll be honest, I felt that way several times. Or, at least that was the case until one of my trouble-makers gave me an unexpected gift.

Halfway through my second year, a student gave me a card that she made. It was an outline of her hand and when you opened it, it said: "Thank you for always making us do what is right".

My unexpected lesson was something I think most of us already know: that what is important is not always going to be the type of degree, the job title we have, or the salary we receive. Instead, it's the impact we bring forward.

You probably have heard of imposter syndrome, right? About not feeling worthy of something, or that you don't belong? That's how I felt while teaching, while getting my Master's, and many other times.

But in reality, I learned that the real imposters are those who ultimately only worry about those types of things- the degree, the title, the salary - and not on doing what is right for them.

When I was graduating, just like you, I was anxious about what I was supposed to do next. I could feel the innocent pressure my peers would place upon me, thinking it was going to be clear skies from now on for me.

Unfortunately, I can assure that that won't be how it goes. But what I can assure you is that as long as you spend your time doing something that is worthwhile to you and that is the right thing for you, your family, and communities - you will never feel like an imposter.

As an alumni of PVCC you are now part of a large community that will support your goals and aspirations. I encourage you to stay connected to the college. There are countless ways for you to do so and support the alumni community from networking & special events, to supporting future students through scholarships and fundraising. Our community

and PVCC can continue to thrive, but it takes people like you, to show the rest of us how to live imposter-free.
