The 2019-2020 Annual Report provides you a glimpse of our marked progress towards our student success goals in the midst of the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic and national unrest. As a result, there were three "lifelines" that lifted PVCC through this academic year:

- 1. Relentless commitment to learning-centered practices
- 2. Steady innovation
- 3. Unyielding resiliency

In March of 2020, PVCC faced an unprecedented challenge; the global pandemic and subsequent quarantine created an extreme shift in our delivery of instruction to online learning for almost the entire spring class schedule, all in a three-week timespan. College faculty and staff demonstrated an "all-in" approach while successfully adapting to the sudden change in the higher educational landscape.

Amidst civil unrest and the ongoing pandemic, our faculty and staff met the challenge to delve deep into the college's processes, systems, technology and learning modalities to discover ways to improve upon what we do to build a brighter future for the next generation of learners. Collectively the college leadership made a commitment that we would emerge from the pandemic as a more accessible, relevant and thriving institution. To this end, we launched the 2021-2023 Strategic Plan, an Action Plan to address closing equity achievement gaps, and the Futures Report.

Additionally, we more clearly defined our social contract around student learning and success by pledging The Puma Commitment to Opportunity. This pledge to our students, faculty, staff, community - and each other - provides the best possible outcomes for anyone who interacts with PVCC. We aspire to develop well-rounded, confident, and responsible individuals who strive to achieve their full potential. The Puma Commitment to Opportunity provides a welcoming, safe, and inspirational learning environment in which everyone is equal and all achievements are celebrated.



FIRST GENERATION STUDENTS

PVCC's first-generation college students make up *nearly half of our student body* and it's not by chance they find their way to PVCC. For many first-gen students, college wasn't even on their radars. To support their successes, we place significant emphasis on community outreach and heightening awareness of programs and scholarships available to them.

3 Strategic Priorities

Ensure high levels of student success, equity, and an excellent experience

- Implemented the Puma Commitment to Opportunity - our pledge to engage, challenge, support, and care for one another.
- The Take Action Now College Team (TACT) brought together more than 40 faculty and staff members to make recommendations on how to address systemic racism and improve college processes and resources for diverse students.
- Developed and implemented several key teams to provide student support and facilitate their success and completion: Peer Mentors across various levels of science curriculum, FOI Advising Teams across multiple industries, and case management advisement with additional hires.
- Created the ALT100 class as an integrated reading and writing course to assist the lowest-scoring English and reading students.
- In partnership with the Phoenix Conservatory of Music, PVCC conducted ensembles and music classes for all students in summer music ensemble classes to teach and learn how to improvise digital musicianship skills.
- As a part of PVCC's enhanced first-year experience, every degree-seeking student enrolled in AAA115, a one-credit student success seminar. Early data demonstrated a higher rate of retention for students in the college's FYE courses.

Cultivate a sustainable, competitive advantage

- Initiated the PVCC Futures: Reimagining the Learning Experience 2023, a compilation of aspirations, ideas and strategic directions forged into three plans to move us boldly and confidently into the future.
- The Integrated Health Science Center (IHSC)
 focused on improving the health and wellbeing of the communities in and around PVCC,
 specifically those who are often low-income and/
 or underinsured or uninsured. Collaborating with
 private and public health partners throughout the
 community, the IHSC hosted wellness events and
 created access to healthcare and education.
- Many of PVCC's classes and subjects are provided at low-to-no-cost open education resources (OER), which led to a direct financial impact of nearly \$100,000 this school year. The OER Specialist Program also won the first innovation award this year.
- Received \$3.6 million from the Governor's office to expand the nursing training, as well as offering incumbent nurse training using high-tech simulation labs.

Build a great place to work and achieve organizational and operational effectiveness

- PVCC secured grants for various significant projects including a \$20,000 National Endowment for the Arts grant to fund a leisure arts program for veterans and a qualitative research study over the next two years, as well as Horizon grants to fund the 3D printers, and a Verizon grant to fund the laptop loaner program.
- Employee and Organizational Learning held the 21st annual End-of-Year Employee Recognition virtually, acknowledging more than 200 employees for national and local awards, years of service, and retirement.
- PVCC was recognized by the Healthy Arizona Worksite Program for positively implementing comprehensive worksite
 wellness strategies. PVCC achieved the Gold level of excellence, acknowledging our commitment to positively impacting
 the health and well-being of our employees, their families, and their communities.

PVCC RESPONDS TO COVID-19

As our community and the country were thrust into the ongoing pandemic, PVCC faculty and staff quickly jumped into action, taking measures to provide safety and support while also making adjustments and restructuring classes for minimal disruption to students' lives.

Some of the ways the college supported the greater PVCC community include:

- Secured a multitude of funds to assist students in hardships attributed to the pandemic. Financial Aid secured nearly \$800,000 in CARES Act students grand funds for 1,905 students, while the Student Emergency Fund netted more than \$30,000, supporting nearly 90 students experiencing distress due to COVID-19.
- 2. The Information Technology and Library teams rapidly deployed a laptop loaner program in Spring 2020 to support students' unanticipated and unprecedented needs to access online learning. Additionally, the library received a \$4,000 grant to purchase Wi-Fi hotspots for students lacking home Internet access.
- 3. The Help Desk/Computer Commons staff and student workers used 3D printers to create Personal Protection Equipment (PPE) face shields in support of Arizona State University's PPE Response Network. Masks also were sent to the Navajo Nation and the University of Arizona in Tucson.
- 4. The Nursing program donated nearly \$2,000 worth of PPE to the State of Arizona to help frontline healthcare workers. This included dozens of N95 masks and gowns, hundreds of face masks, and 2,100 pairs of gloves, in addition to entire PPE kits.
- 5. The Club Education students brought some relief to stay-athome parents, creating 100 "STEAM Party Packs" to entertain children while their parents work from home. The kit included instructions and supplies to create a catapult, a paper and straw airplane, a paper helicopter and an origami project, as well as a science workbook or picture book, all of which were delivered to Paradise Valley Unified School District schools for distribution.
- 6. Appointments for virtual person-to-person student assistance increased significantly during the 2019-20 academic year, surpassing the demand for in-person appointments the previous year. These virtual meetings were held through chat, phone or video, and students regularly commented on their importance.

EARLY COLLEGE

PVCC and the Arizona Agribusiness and Equine Center (AAEC) celebrated 20 years of partnership. High school students who choose to jump start their careers can take college courses free of charge through this unique partnership. Nearly 25 percent of these students complete their associates degree before graduating high school, eliminating two years of college tuition.

The 2020 AAEC graduating class had 59 students.

- 14 students earned degrees/AAEC 10 PVCC AAS degrees, 4 AAEC completers.
- 1,463 credit hours completed, for an average of 24.8 credits per student.

PVCC's Early College Programs department served a total of 644 students between their ACE, HOL, PEC, and AAEC student populations. As a whole, these students took 5,942 credits with a completion rate of 87 percent, despite having to shift from in-person to online learning because of the pandemic and navigating new learning platforms and technology challenges.

NEW PROGRAMS

- AAFA in Popular Music targets musicians who write, arrange, record, and perform their own original music. Students learn the craft of songwriting and the art of performing live, all aimed at creating successful musical entrepreneurs.
- Game on! Business/IT and Fine and Performing Arts collaborated to offer an AAS in Video Game Production, providing students a head start into this exciting and emerging field.
- Those wishing to specialize in computer science can now get a head start with the Computer Science AS, which provides the first two years of a four-year curriculum.
- The Engineering program now provides the majority of the first two years of a four-year curriculum for students who wish to transfer to a four-year institution to earn a bachelor's degree in an engineering discipline.

HONORS PROGRAM The Honors program pushes students to further develop critical thinking, communication and leadership skills spawning opportunities through scholarships, field trips and full faculty immersion. Awarded nearly \$800.000 in scholarships • Two students awarded the All-USA scholarship More than 400 students served • 20% of PVCC students received an Honors scholarship

Looking Ahead

Having received the first Cisco Academy status, PVCC will be offering courses for CISCO CCNA certification in the Fall 2020. The three courses offered prepare students to complete the Cisco CCNA switching and routing certification and are also offered as part of a CCL and degree program in networking and cyber security. The CCNA is an internationally recognized certification that is highly sought after from employers from various industries. PVCC plans to launch its first cohort in Fall 2021.

Athletics

PVCC serves as a model among NJCAA athletic programs for excellence in academic success and athletic achievement. We proudly offer 12 intercollegiate athletics programs, all of which empower Puma student-athletes to achieve championship performance, while preparing them for life after intercollegiate athletics. In March 2020, the NJCAA announced that Spring seasons (baseball, softball, golf, tennis, and outdoor track & field) were canceled due to COVID-19.

There were many achievements for our Pumas to celebrate in 2019-2020!

- Men's and Women's Cross Country teams advance to NJCAA National Championship; Men's placed 11th; Women's placed 12th
- Men's Soccer advanced to Region 1 Tournament
- Women's Soccer named Region 1 Champions
- Women's Soccer advanced to West District Championship
- Men's and Women's Indoor Track & Field teams both advanced to NJCAA National Championship; Men's tying for 23rd; Womens tying for 28th
- 12 Puma teams earned NJCAA All-Academic Team honors, maintaining a cumulative 3.0 GPA or higher
- Men's Outdoor Track & Field named an NJCAA Academic Team of the Year, posting the highest GPA in the nation (3.44) for all NJCAA men's Outdoor Track & Field teams
- Record tying 37 student-athletes received NJCAA All-Academic honors, posting a 3.6 GPA or higher

Generosity in Action

In Spring 2020, as PVCC learned of the immediate need to support students financially impacted directly by the global pandemic, we officially established the **Paradise Valley Community College Student Emergency Fund.**Our community generously poured an abundance of support into this much needed service, and to date, more than 80 students have received support. With the help of our kindhearted community, the fund will continue to provide emergency support to PVCC students beyond COVID-19.


Overall, philanthropic support generated **more than \$95,000** for student support. Through the Maricopa Community College Foundation, 208 scholarships were awarded to our PVCC students for more than \$145,000.

We celebrate our PVCC alumni regularly, however, these individuals made a special effort to give back to their communities and help businesses adapt during the COVID-19 crisis.

- Yohanna Wendt and Lysette Hill of Sister Power, LLC reached out to the community
 to provide an increased online presence to bring hope, support, and stress relief. The
 dynamic sister duo created immune supporting, home cleaning kits to hand out.
- Aioli Burgers founders Kyle Hollenbeck and Tommy D'Ambrosio focused on a two-fold mission: continue to employ their staff and feed their community during the pandemic. They created a rotating menu in which meals were prepared and cooked and just needed to be reheated. Additionally, the two delivered meals to first responders.
 - With companies having to transition employees to a work from home (WFH)
 environment, Adam and Amber Wong offered a free Work From Home Assessment
 Tool through their company Rockstar Workforce to help improve communication. The
 report at the end of the assessment provides personalized WFH tips and strategies for
 communicating with employees.
